Introduction

Dear stakeholder

Over recent months, Red Tractor's Board and Sector Boards have been listening carefully to farmers and the wider industry about what you need from Red Tractor. One message has come through clearly: standards need to be robust, but they must also be practical, proportionate and reflect the realities of farming today.

We are listening, and this review is an important opportunity to make sure your experience, and views help shape what comes next.

Technical Advisory Committees and Sector Boards have been working through the standards line by line, challenging every requirement: does it need to be there, is it clear, can it be justified, and does it reflect how farms actually work? This work has resulted in a significant reduction in the number of requirements, around a third for Beef & Lamb and almost a quarter for Dairy. That means fewer individual points to assess, while maintaining the same robust standards and credibility of assurance.

The proposed new standards for Beef & Lamb and Dairy are now open for consultation, and we want to hear from you.

You will work with these standards every day. You know what will work, what could be clearer and where unnecessary complexity can be removed. That insight is invaluable.

Your standards. Your say.

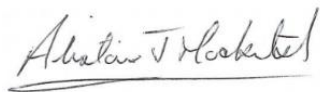

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How the proposals are presented

The proposals are presented in 16 sections, one for each area of the standards, each with a set of questions for you to consider. You do not have to complete every section. Go to the areas that matter to your enterprise and skip the rest. If a section only applies to dairy, for example, and you run a beef unit, you are welcome to move past it.

What you'll find in each section

Every section follows the same order:

- **Aim** – why the standards in this area exist and what they are there to protect
- **Summary of proposed changes** – a short overview of what is changing, and why
- **Proposed standards** – the full detail, set out in tables
- **Your feedback** – the questions we would like you to answer

Reading the tables

The proposed standards are set out in tables. Each table sets out one row per standard or audit point. The columns tell you:

- **Standard and Audit point** – the reference code, so you can quote it in your feedback
- **Sector** – which enterprises the requirement applies to
- **Documents required** – the record or document an assessor would ask to see
- **Template available** – (T) means Red Tractor provides a template you can use
- **Regulatory / legal requirement** – (L) means this is already required by law
- **Standard / audit point status** – what is happening to this requirement

Where a column does not apply to a particular row, it shows N/A.

What the status labels mean

- **New** - a requirement that does not exist in the current standards
- **Revised** - the requirement itself has changed
- **Upgraded** - the requirement now carries more weight, such as a recommendation becoming a full standard
- **Editorial change** - the wording has been clarified, with no change to what is required
- **Moved** - the same requirement, relocated to a different section
- **Retained** - no change

Two types of question

Each section asks for feedback in two ways:

- **Specific feedback** – on a particular proposed change we would especially like your view on
- **Overarching feedback** – on the section as a whole, and anything else you want to raise

Both are optional, and every scored question has a free-text box beneath it. The comments are as valuable to us as the ratings.

Understanding what's required

Standards, audit points and recommendations set different levels of requirements.

- **Standards:** Detail the requirements that Red Tractor members must demonstrate. All standards must be met.
- **Key Standards:** A standard of elevated or particular significance. A major non-conformance raised against a Key Standard (indicating total disregard for the requirements) will result in a suspension of certification until the non-conformance has been addressed or can be legitimately downgraded to a minor non-conformance, allowing 28 days for corrective action. Denoted by **(Key)** alongside the Standard reference e.g. **XX.1 (Key)**
- **Audit Points:** Provide additional detail about how the Standard will be assessed. Annotated by a lower-case letter following the Standard reference e.g. XX.1.a
- **Recommendations:** Provide guidance on best practice and are assessed to aid industry knowledge and understanding, but do not require compliance. Recommendations do not pre-empt future standards. Some recommendations have remained recommendations since the scheme began.

Unless otherwise stated, the number coding of Standards and Audit Points is consistent with that in version 5 of the Standards. Coding may be modified in final standards.

Proposed changes to standards

Documents and Procedures (DP)

Aim

To enable farmers to give assurance to customers and consumers that effective records and procedures are in place to manage issues relating to food safety, animal welfare and farm management.

Producers record and respond to complaints where relevant, supporting traceability, accountability and continuous improvement on the farm.

Summary of proposed changes:

These requirements have been moved out of Documents and Procedures (DP) into a new section to better reflect the requirements and align with devolved nations. Additional wording has been added to provide clarity on why external areas should be kept clear, including to ensure animal health and food safety and prevent vermin. Ensuring livestock are separated from hazardous materials has also been upgraded to a standard as this sits outside of farm appearance and is a distinct issue.

Changes in detail

- DP 1.1 and DP.1.1.a were merged into a standard
- DP.1.b was made a standard for greater emphasis

Proposed Standards

Farm Maps

A map of the farm is needed to ensure clear ownership and responsibilities for farm management, along with identifying specific risks that may need to be considered.

GUIDANCE:

One or more maps may be used. Map may be held as a hard copy or as electronic documents.

Include all land you farm and manage, whether owned or rented, including long-term lets and grazing agreements, if you are responsible for inputs or environmental management.

Do not include land where you have no control over how it is farmed.

Emergency Procedures

Livestock farms operate in environments where events outside normal day-to-day control can arise quickly and have serious consequences. A clear, documented contingency plan helps ensure that appropriate actions can be taken promptly and consistently.

The standard has been updated to reflect the increased reliance on mobile phones to access contact information.

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GUIDANCE:

Livestock farms operate in environments where events outside normal day-to-day control can arise quickly and have serious consequences for animal welfare, milk quality, environmental protection and business continuity. A clear, documented contingency plan helps ensure that appropriate actions can be taken promptly and consistently when unexpected situations occur.

Making the plan accessible to all staff ensures that responsibilities and actions are understood, even when key individuals are unavailable or when decisions need to be taken urgently.

Complaints Record

A record of complaints will enable the farmer and assessor to identify any persistent issues that need to be resolved. This is a requirement for earned recognition for food and feed hygiene with the Food Standards Agency.

This standard has been reworded, and the standard and audit point merged, to better reflect when a record should be kept.

GUIDANCE:

Record complaints made by a local authority, general public, customers (e.g. abattoir feedback) or other. Complaints include, but are not limited to, medicine residue levels; milk test fails; dirty stock; welfare; and environmental issues.

Antibiotic Fails

Antibiotic residues can cause antibiotic resistance which makes it harder to treat bacterial diseases in humans and animals, presenting a significant health threat. This standard has been updated to require all antibiotics fails to have an industry investigation form and training for repeat fails.

Farm Appearance (FA)

Aim

A well-maintained farm helps to uphold confidence in farming standards, and decreases risks related to animal welfare, staff safety and the reputation the British farming industry.

Summary of proposed changes

These requirements have been moved out of Documents and Procedures (DP) into a new section to better reflect the requirements and align with devolved nations. Additional wording has been added to provide clarity on why external areas should be kept clear, including to ensure animal health and food safety and prevent vermin. Ensuring livestock are separated from hazardous materials has also been upgraded to a standard as this sits outside of farm appearance and is a distinct issue.

Changes in detail

- DP 1.1 and DP.1.1.a were merged into a standard
- DP.1.b was made a standard for greater emphasis

GUIDANCE:

Any waste awaiting collection or disposal is stored appropriately i.e. in a dedicated area away from livestock. Old machinery, tyres, wire and silage wrap are stored neatly. External areas around buildings should be kept clear to discourage vermin.

Animal Traceability (TI)

Aim

To maintain consumer confidence and the reputation of British food and farming through credible claims about the origins and traceability of Red Tractor assured produce, from farms to pack. These requirements also provide assurance that produce meets UK legislation in relation to animal identification and movement records.

Summary of proposed changes

There are minimal changes proposed in this section. Two standards and two audit points have been removed, improving the auditability of the standards and removing unnecessary requirements. Other changes are minor editorial improvements.

Changes in detail

- TI.3 and TI.3.b were removed
- TI.5.a was merged into a standard
- TI.4.1 was removed as it was felt unnecessary until lifetime assurance can be implemented

Proposed Standards

Traceability is fundamental to maintaining consumer confidence and the reputation of assurance schemes and the wider industry. Farmers must be able to demonstrate that products are fully traceable to their origin. Reliable identification and movement records support accountability and a timely response to potential risks.

Producers should ensure systems are in place to identify animals and record movements in accordance with current UK legislation. While robust traceability remains the immediate priority, Red Tractor's longer-term ambition is to support a framework that could enable lifetime assurance, when the necessary industry infrastructure, data integrity and market conditions are in place.

Vermin Control (VC)

Aim

Vermin and other pests can be a source of contamination and pose a risk to food and feed safety. Pests also carry diseases that present a biosecurity or human health risk and may cause damage to buildings and equipment. Strategies and practices to manage these risks should be context based and proportionate to the level of risk present. Effective management of vermin control protects food safety and protects industry reputation.

Summary of proposed changes:

One standard and nine audit points have been removed, leaving one standard and one audit point. Following amendments to the requirements set by the Campaign for Responsible Rodenticides Use (CRRU), farmers using or buying professional rodenticides now need to complete CRRU approved training, with rodenticide use being 'managed' by rodenticide suppliers. Therefore, there is no need to duplicate CRRU requirements. The risk of vermin causing a food safety issue in this sector is low. The remaining requirement is a legal requirement under the Feed Hygiene Regulations EU 183/2005.

Changes in detail

- VC.1 has been re-worded to be more descriptive where effective control of vermin needs to be
- VC.1.a is incorporated into the VC.1 standard
- VC.1.b and c have been removed
- VC.1.b has been re-purposed into VC.1.a so that records are kept to detail what action has been taken in case of an infestation
- VC.2 and VC.2.a-VC.2.h has been removed

Proposed Standards

To ensure farm buildings and feed storage areas are kept free from vermin, protecting animal and human health, feed quality and the condition of buildings.

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GUIDANCE:

Effective vermin control means keeping pests under control, with no evidence of vermin present. To help prevent disease, protect feed and milk, and keep buildings in good condition.

An infestation of vermin is generally defined as a persistent or widespread presence of pests (such as rats, mice, birds, or insects) evidenced by repeated sightings or clear signs of activity, indicating that normal control measures are not effectively managing the problem.

Fallen Stock (FS)

Aim

To ensure fallen stock is managed, stored and disposed of in a safe, secure and responsible manner, reducing the risk of spreading disease, contamination and attracting pests, while protecting animal health, public health, biosecurity and the environment.

Summary of proposed changes:

The fallen stock standards have been streamlined to reduce duplication by merging overlapping standards and audit points while maintaining the same assurance outcomes. Requirements for the prompt removal, secure storage and visibility of fallen stock have been consolidated into clearer standards, with key details retained in the standard wording. The disposal standard has been reworded to better reflect current legislation, with permitted disposal methods moved to the audit point. This does not change the outcome of the requirement and continues to accommodate legal regional variations, such as on-farm burial where permitted in parts of Scotland.

Changes in detail

- FS.1 and FS.1.a has been merged into a standard
- FS.2, FS.2.a and FS.2.b have been merged into one standard

- FS.3.a removed as covered in FS.2
- FS.3.c removed as covered by the standard and can still bury in places e.g. Orkney

Proposed Standards

Effective fallen stock management is essential to maintaining biosecurity and preventing the spread of disease. Prompt, safe storage and disposal of fallen stock help reduce the risks of contamination, pest attraction and environmental harm, while protecting animal health, public health and consumer confidence.

Youngstock (YS)

Aim

To ensure artificially reared calves, lambs and goats are managed in a way that promotes good health, welfare and development by providing appropriate colostrum management, nutrition, housing and daily care, in line with UK legislation and DEFRA Welfare Codes, while reassuring consumers and customers that youngstock are reared to high welfare standards.

Summary of proposed changes:

Limited changes have been made to this section. Existing requirements remain largely unchanged, with proposals focused on improving clarity and reducing duplication. Related audit points have been merged, visual and tactile contact has been separated out as a standalone welfare requirement, and additional guidance has been added on milk feeding to support youngstock growth and development.

Changes in detail

- CR.1.a merged into the standard
- Merged CR.1.c and CR.1.g into a single audit point
- CR.1.i and CR.1.J have been merged based on NC rate
- CR.2.d and CR.2.d removed as repeated in other audit points
- CR.2.f and CR.2.g removed as merged into other audit points (YS.3.d) to better reflect legislation
- CR.1.e made into a standard to emphasis importance

Proposed Standards

These standards are legally grounded in The Welfare of Farmed Animals (England) Regulations 2007 and the Animal Welfare Act 2006, which mandate that livestock housing and nutrition prevent suffering and promote natural behaviours. The updates streamline compliance by merging overlapping audit points (such as feeding equipment cleanliness and tethering restrictions) to eliminate complexity, while moving social contact to its own dedicated standard to elevate herd welfare. Furthermore, the updated milk volume guidelines (15–20% of bodyweight) align the framework with modern veterinary consensus, ensuring youngstock receive optimal planes of nutrition for immune health and growth.

**Livestock Transport (LT)****Aim**

To ensure livestock are transported responsibly by competent, trained personnel in a manner that minimises stress, injury, and suffering. To ensure that only fit animals are moved to protect welfare and mitigate industry reputational risk, while requiring strict compliance with UK legislation through rigorous pre-travel assessments and optimised journey planning. To establish consistent management practices that safeguard animal welfare, food safety, and product quality, while protecting the health and safety of workers and visitors through secure site and traffic controls.

Summary of proposed changes:

The livestock transport standards have been streamlined for better clarity and auditability on the farm. Multiple specific sub-clauses regarding vehicle condition have been removed and re-worded to focus strictly on the required outcome: maintaining vehicles and trailers in good physical condition to prevent animal injury. To improve assessment efficiency, some operational rules have been removed

because they are functionally unauditable unless witnessed directly on the day of inspection, while overlapping clauses are merged or relocated to the production livestock section to reduce duplication.

Changes in detail

- LT.1.a, b, e, f, g, h, i, j, k and m were removed and the standard re-worded so that it's clear what the outcome of the standard is that vehicles inc. trailers are kept in good condition to avoid injury and suffering. This allows the assessor to raise an issue if one was identified, the NC data shows this is a low level non conformance
- LT.3.b and c have been removed as the standard outlines the requirements plus it is unauditable unless seen on the day
- LT.4.a has been merged into LT.4.b
- LT.5 and LT.7 have been moved to PL section
- LT.6 was deemed unnecessary as most farmers will not be travelling over 8 hours and will have a mobile phone
- LT.8 was removed as deemed unnecessary for RT to be checking when typically, this is a commercial haulage that would be doing over 8 hours not a farmer

These standards are legally required to safeguard livestock welfare and maintain national biosecurity. Keeping vehicles hazard-free and leak-proof prevents animal injuries and stops environmental road contamination.

All Transport Off Farm

These standards are legally required to ensure that only livestock fit to endure travel without suffering are approved for transport. Prohibiting the transit of heavily pregnant, newborn, severely injured, or unshackled animals protects vulnerable livestock from extreme distress and permanent injury. Managing youngstock transit limits, stocking densities, and bedding is legally required to provide essential thermal comfort and prevent crush injuries. Beyond animal fitness, farmers must maintain clear yard access, monitor ground conditions, and communicate loading challenges in advance, as efficient haulier collection plans are vital to prevent delays that compromise animal welfare.

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Housing and Facilities (HF)

Aim

To be able to demonstrate to consumers and customers that products originate from farms that safeguard animal welfare through suitable, well-maintained environments. By aligning housing design, space, ventilation, and handling facilities with UK legislation and DEFRA Welfare Codes, standards promote safety, cleanliness, and comfort while minimising livestock stress and injury. To deliver a high-quality, hygienic environment on farms that directly supports animal productivity, reduces disease risks, and enables effective daily inspection, handling, and care.

Summary of proposed changes:

The section has been restructured to group related standards and audit points together, making assessments easier to conduct and providing greater clarity for members on what is expected. The standards and audit points have also been streamlined where appropriate. In addition, new recommendations have been introduced for dairy cattle to reflect the sector's direction of travel towards improved animal welfare. These have been included as recommendations, rather than mandatory standards, because the supporting evidence and practical implementation are still evolving, and the sector is not yet in a position where consistent mandatory requirements can be justified or applied.

GUIDANCE: Dairy Specific

The comfort of dairy cows is of paramount importance to ensure high productivity and to meet animal welfare needs. The design of cubicles and lying surface material should provide a sufficiently comfortable environment to encourage cows to lie down.

Where to find help:

The Cow Comfort Index (CCI) is a welfare measure that reflects how many cows are lying down. It is measured by counting the number of cows in cubicles and determining what proportion of them are actually lying down, calculated as the number of lying cows divided by the total number of cows in the cubicles, then multiplied by 100%. A well-designed, comfortable housing system should achieve a CCI of at least 85%, meaning most cows choose to lie down rather than remain standing.

Lighting

To ensure livestock housing is adequately lit to support normal behaviour, allow effective inspection and management of animals, and promote their health, welfare and safety.

Feed and Water (FW)

Aim

Consumers are increasingly conscious of animal welfare issues and require greater assurance that livestock are cared for appropriately on farm. Correct nutrition of the animal is vital to good performance, animal health and food safety. Whilst beef and lamb are largely fed on grass or grass silage, it is common practice to supplement with both home-produced and purchased feedstuffs during winter, lambing and weaning.

Summary of proposed changes:

The section has been re-ordered, with related standards and audit points grouped together to make assessment easier and clarify what is expected. This section is aligned with feed and food hygiene legislation, ensuring the standards provide earned recognition with the Food Standards Agency.

Animal Medicines (AM)

Aim

To enable farmers to demonstrate to customers and consumers that livestock are maintained in a healthy condition to support the production of safe livestock. Animals must be kept in good health, with medicines and treatments used responsibly to safeguard animal health and food safety. Withdrawal periods must be observed to ensure residues do not enter the food chain. Accurate records must be maintained to support traceability and demonstrate compliance.

Summary of proposed changes:

These standards ensure that all individuals involved in livestock care have the appropriate skills, knowledge and training to carry out their duties effectively, in accordance with current UK legislation and DEFRA Welfare Codes. Producers will ensure that staff are competent in handling livestock, recognising signs of ill health and maintaining good standards of husbandry. The producer will be aware that competent stockmanship is fundamental to animal welfare, food safety and productivity. Ongoing training and supervision will be in place to support continuous improvement and ensure that tasks are carried out safely, consistently and responsibly.

Animal Health (AH)

Aim

To provide consumers and customers with assurance that livestock is maintained in a healthy condition, ensuring that the beef and lamb they purchase is safe to eat and cared for appropriately on farm.

These standards ensure that animals are well managed by competent stockmen to good standards of husbandry and welfare in accordance with current UK legislation and DEFRA Welfare Codes. The producer will be aware that the health of the animals is crucial, both to food safety and productivity on the farm. Producers will have a close relationship with their veterinary surgeon and will be conscious of the need to try to prevent animal health problems specific to the farm. The importance of recording animal health data is key to ensuring effective and timely decisions can be made.

Summary of proposed changes:

The requirements for a health plan and health and performance review have been redeveloped to better reflect the requirements of the sector. Prescriptive elements have been removed, allowing for more farm-specific discussions between the member and vet based on issues that are impacting the farm. Additionally, following the consultation on the Animal Health and Welfare Pathway Review, the proposed standards align more closely with legislation, reducing duplication and recognising work that is ongoing within the industry to improve the health of farm animals.

The section has also been re-ordered for clarity to show what is expected of members. Static documents within the health plan have been moved into a subsection, as these documents only need updating when changes in practice occur rather than every year. These requirements fulfil legislation within the DEFRA Codes of Recommendations for the Welfare of Livestock for sheep and cattle.

The review involves collecting herd or flock information, assembling health and disease records, evaluating productivity measures, and assessing mortality and culling data.

Euthanasia

Prompt and appropriate action is essential where an animal's condition deteriorates and recovery is unlikely. Farmers and stockpersons should be able to recognise signs of severe injury, illness or distress, and make timely decisions to prevent avoidable suffering. Competent personnel should be readily available and trained in the use of approved euthanasia methods. Animals requiring euthanasia should be handled calmly and humanely, ensuring stress is minimised. Confirmation of death is carried out, and carcasses disposed of in accordance with legal requirements.

Milk Production (MP)

Aim

The aim of milk production standards is to ensure milk is produced safely, hygienically and to a high quality. Producers are responsible for implementing effective milking, storage and hygiene practices that minimise contamination, protect animal health and welfare, and ensure milk meets food safety and quality requirements throughout the production process. Maintaining these standards also supports compliance with dairy hygiene legislation and Red Tractor's earned recognition with the Food Standards Agency.

Summary of proposed changes:

This section has been reordered to better reflect the legislation and make it clearer what the member should be doing and what the assessor is looking for. Like-for-like items have been grouped together and subheadings created to split the section into manageable parts.

Environmental Protection (EC)

Aim

Environmental protection aims to minimise the impact of farming activities on the environment by preventing pollution, protecting soil and water resources, managing waste responsibly and promoting the sustainable use of natural resources. Effective environmental management helps safeguard ecosystems and maintain farm productivity. A nutrient management plan supports soil health, reduces water pollution risk and reflects the direction of regulation.

Summary of proposed changes:

The majority of requirements in this section have been maintained. The key change is the replacement of a manure management plan with a nutrient management plan, identifying where and how much manure and fertiliser can be spread based on crop need and soil type. The proposed standards go further than previous requirements by requiring farmers to identify where they should and should not spread and to match applications to crop need and soil type. These standards apply to members in England only. Members in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland comply with their own local requirements, which the standard recognises explicitly.

Urea (UR)

Aim

By demonstrating that urea fertilisers are only used where appropriate, the agricultural industry can evidence responsible nutrient management through a voluntary stewardship approach. This industry-led approach was developed to offset a proposed ban on unprotected urea fertilisers, helping retain access to an important fertiliser option without the need for further regulatory intervention.

As agriculture is a devolved matter, the requirements relating to unprotected or uninhibited fertiliser containing urea currently apply only in England.

Recycled Manure Solids (RMS)

Aim

Recycled Manure Solids (RMS) are included in the Red Tractor Dairy Standards to ensure they are produced and used safely, legally and hygienically, protecting animal health, welfare and milk quality. The standards also support DEFRA recognition by demonstrating that the risks associated with RMS are managed through clear, auditable requirements and good farming practice.
